Course Description

This course is intended for the intelligent student of faith. Originally, it was only offered to rabbinical students in the final year of their study. As a prerequisite for this course, a student must have a firm foundation in the Torah, a solid understanding of Judaic practices and beliefs, and the ability to read Hebrew. From this foundation the content of the course attempts to elevate one's mind from the literal and terrestrial understanding of existence into the mystical and metaphysical realms of knowledge. The word Kabbalah derives from the verb קבל meaning "receive." Therefore, it is received wisdom. Good teachers can provide students with information, but only students with an open heart can truly receive what the Creator has to offer. I pray that your heart is open and receptive to the concepts we will encounter in this seminar.

The methodology of this course was developed by my father, Chief Rabbi Levi Ben Levy, a kaballistic master who inherited the esoteric tradition from his teacher, Chief Rabbi W.A. Matthew, who taught many of the topics presented here in a masonic lodge he founded called "The Royal Order of Ethiopian Hebrews Sons and Daughters of Culture." In addition, we are using an authoritative text entitled *Meditation and Kabbalah* written by the great zadek, Rabbi Aryeh Kaplan. Through a combination of these sources, the student will acquire an understanding of all the major kaballistic schools of thought. However, our emphasis will be on learning those techniques that allow us to achieve higher spiritual enlightenment—specifically the study of sefirot and gematria.

This course is a gateway into a world of kabbalistic mysteries. Mastering these techniques will require a lifetime. This seminar is where your metaphysical journey begins.

Course Objectives

By the end of the semester, successful students will have acquired the ability to:

- ✓ *Explain* the sefirot.
- ✓ *Apply* gematria to various names, words, and prayers.
- ✓ *Engage* in several forms of kabbalistic meditation.

Course Requirements

- 3. Midterm Exam 25%
