Obituary

James J. Williams, Rabbi Eliyahu ben Hammurabi ben Yehudah, died April 17, 2024, in Jacksonville, Florida. He was born on August 20, 1946, in Flushing, Queens, New York, the son of James John Alfred Williams, Sr. and Gloria Ethel Lashley-Williams.

James graduated from Thomas Jefferson High School, Brooklyn, New York, Class of 1964. Following graduation, he earned his Associates of Arts Degree from New York City College of Technology. After graduating, he worked at the New York Stock Exchange as a Clerk for 7 years, until he decided to pursue his Bachelor's degree at Brooklyn College.

He enjoyed cycling, reading, watching movies, and playing the alto and soprano saxophones. Rabbi Eliyahu was a generous and charismatic man who used his insight and strong will to forge life-long friendships throughout his community. These qualities were only second to his everlasting love and loyalty to his wife, Rabbinith Nadivah (Patricia).
